Hi Stella,

We have reviewed the materials and there are two concerns,

1. 6.2 Personal Safety (attachment) "Safe, Unsafe & Confusing Touch"

We are currently working on updating this information to align with best practices. The terms that will replace 'safe, unsafe, confusing touch' will be 'okay/not okay touch'. The content will continue to discuss what the difference between the two are, listening to your gut when something doesn't feel right, that there are NO secrets around touches and that adults should always believe a child when they tell them something like that.

It may be a few months before this is completed, but we would approve use of the material for now.

2. Images of covered body parts.

We do not support the change to cover body parts in the images when teaching sexual health. Our goal in showing all body parts is to reduce stigma and shame when talking about sexual health. Discussing actual body parts is part of learning about sexual health.

Would you consider using the original images?
